### OLD BUSINESS

**Treasurer's Report and Annual Dues:** Our treasurer, Dana Dunn, was unable to attend our meeting, but reported via our Yahoo! group that we have \$1,152.55 in our treasury.

**Group Project:** Cathy led a discussion of a Group Project for 2012. Spurred on by a report from Projects Committee Chair, Christine Bo-Linn, that the Marin Free Clinic and children's hospitals need premie hats and sweaters, suggestions were made to do Fair Isle and/or lace baby hats (and sweaters) for preemies for charity. We also discussed steeking, the thought of which many of us find quite challenging.

In a previous year, Guild members did Elizabeth Zimmermann's "Baby Surprise Jacket," published in 1968 for our

### CHARITY PROJECTS

**Prayer Shawl Project for Cancer Research:** Nazee Fard created six prayer shawl patterns for a book with the working title "Prayer Shawl Designs from the Heart" to benefit cancer research. Last year, she asked Diane Sack, Marcia Hammett, Christine Bo-Linn, Jane Cooperman, and her mother to create prayer shawls from her original patterns using yarn provided free of charge by several yarn companies. Nazee also made a prayer shawl and added trim to several of the others. The shawls are done and she is working on the pattern text for a publication. She had her team pose with their shawls for her upcoming publication. Nazee discussed auctioning the shawls off to earn additional money for Brain Cancer Research. All of the prayer shawls received praise for their beauty and originality.

Nazee mentioned that there is also a walk for brain cancer research on May 5<sup>th</sup> in Golden Gate Park. Nazee needs to raise funds for her participation. She will post more information on the Yahoo list soon, but here is the URL for the Brain Tumor Walk in San Francisco:

**The Doll Project – Stitchin' for Kids:** Caroline Archer reported that she needed 24 hats for baby dolls for toddlers (since our January meeting, she has received quite a few, but please keep those hats coming). The pattern for the hats is on our web site (go to Projects, Caroline Archer's Doll Patterns, *Baby Doll Hats*). She also thanked Guild members for doll sweaters and hats turned in prior to this meeting and for several provided at today's meeting. She always needs more doll hats and sweaters as each girl receiving a doll gets five sweaters as part of the 12 outfits that go with each doll. Hat and sweater patterns are also available on our web site. **More Yarn Donations:** Diane Sack brought in more yarn given to her for our charity work.

### MEDIA AND SHOP REPORTS

Christine Bo-Linn passed around an article from the New York Times regarding the stunning auction price of a schoolgirl embroidery made in 1807 on linen using silk thread. Its auction estimate was \$120,000, but it went for \$1,700,000.

## FEBRUARY GUILD PROGRAM

### FIMO BUTTONS

Nazee Fard taught Guild members to make polymer clay buttons, usually called "Fimo Buttons." She also brought along several garments to which she had matched button colors to hard-to-match yarn colors (matching her salmon-colored sweater otherwise would have been impossible). Another Guild member, Leona Thoelecke, wore a sweater trimmed in Fimo buttons she made at a Fimo Buttons program taught by Nazee a few years ago.

Nazee provided gloves for working with the polymer clay, the clay, forms that look like miniature muffin or candy molds, baby power to keep the buttons from sticking to the molds (not necessary for flat surfaces), parchment paper to apply to the cooking pan (a pie pan works well) and a toaster oven to bake and harden the buttons.

Nazee also mentioned the following: To prevent sticking, shake some baby powder into the tins when using molds. Varnish is used for finished buttons. Be careful about toxic fumes: if you cover the container when baking the buttons there is no problem. The fumes are toxic mostly when buttons are burnt (which is easy to do). If you use any utensil, pots, dishes, etc., for baking buttons, do not use them for cooking.

It didn't take long for Guild members to learn how to blend several colors of clay into just the right color, roll out and form buttons, poke holes into them for sewing them onto garments and bake their buttons in Marcia's toaster oven. After baking, Fimo buttons still are somewhat soft, but they will harden when they cool. Materials for Fimo buttons are available at craft stores.

For additional help, Nazee passed around a list of YouTube and Fimo and Sculpey company web sites. This project was so much fun and so useful that we agreed that we should repeat it every few years. It will save us lots of money on purchasing commercial buttons and the buttons we make will amaze our friends.



## SHOW AND TELL

Guild members displayed projects in process and discussed knit items they were wearing. One member brought along a group of rosettes that she had made from the free pattern Elaine Johnson brought to our attention at our December 2011 meeting. Several members were interested in making rosettes for hats or other items. The pattern is available in Louisa Harding's new book called *Knitting in the Details: Charming Designs to Knit and Embellish*. Alternatively, Google for "Louisa Harding Rosette Pattern." Another member brought along several Fair Isle baby hats that inspired our Group Project, and another member showed a knit dress that is about three-fourths completed. We asked her to bring it back when done. We took a picture of one table of Guild members as they all showed up in lavender or purple outfits.

## UPCOMING PROGRAMS

**Afghan:** We still need to discuss making an afghan for the person who contributed yarn to our December meeting who now is in assisted living.

**Neckline Secrets:** We are looking forward to a demonstration of sewing down stitch by stitch (instead of casting off) crew neck style necklines. And other timely tips.
